Highlights from this year's events were many; following is a review of the year of fun, education, enlightenment and engagement that many of us were lucky to participate in.

Carnival Cruises CEO Ann Sherry kicked off our club year with an overview of the importance of the cruise sector to the tourism industry in Australia. She relayed her professional experiences of the early days Swine Flu epidemic and also shared her thoughts on diversity and specifically women's leadership in corporate Australia.

In a bid to attract new and lapsed members to the club Patrick Reagan organised a fun and educational Wine Tasting Night. We were delighted to have McWilliams Wines sponsor the event and to have their Chief Winemaker lead us in a wine identification competition, with fantastic prizes for the lucky ones. Thank you to CEO of McWilliams, George Wahby for sponsoring this event and for offering to do so again next year. Thank you also to UBS who provided the facility for the event in their beautiful offices.

A great event that appeared back on the calendar this year was a revitalisation of the inter-school debate. This year we had Harvard and Yale versus Oxford and Cambridge. The debate was moderated by Peter Van Onselen of The Australian and was sponsored by KPMG and Lion Nathan. Thank you to our valiant Harvard debater Paul Hunyor and to Councillor Lisa George for organising this well received event.

In late May, Club members were mentally transported back to Aldrich, for a case study conducted by HBS Senior Lecturer Stephen Kaufman. The case study, while disguised, was strikingly similar to the series of events that Google encountered when they first looked to IPO the company. There was great discussion about the case and participants were reminded that customer selection can ultimately dictate strategy. Choosing the wrong customers, even just once, can lead to a 'Tyranny of Incrementalism' that ultimately dictates strategy.

Menzies Scholarship

The Menzies Scholarship is funded by contributions from Harvard alumni and by the Menzies Foundation and is jointly administered by the Harvard Club of Australia, the Australian National University and the Menzies Foundation.

Scholars are chosen on the basis of their potential for making a significant contribution to Australia and their intellectual ability, intellectual qualities, and breadth of vision. This year's scholars are part of the vanguard of Australian talent that attends Harvard.

Gregory Keane is currently a consultant Psychiatrist at the Peninsula Health Service, Salvation Army Health Service and Alfred Health in Victoria. His focus is maternal and child infant health with a focus on the most vulnerable and disadvantaged. He will study for a Masters in Public Health (Health Policy and Management) at the Harvard School of Public Health.

Lakshmi Nayanan Vootakuru has worked extensively in remote and indigenous communities around Australia and currently works in the field of anaesthetics at Concord Hospital in NSW. She will study for a Masters in Public Health (Health Policy and Management) at the Harvard School of Public Health.

I would like to thank the Menzies selection committee for their role in administering the scholarship and selecting the scholars. The members of this year's committee were Jim Fox, Kim Rubenstein and Suiwah Leung from the ANU; Edwina Menzies from the Menzies Foundation; and Michelle Patterson, Charles Irwin and Alice Hill from the HCA. Professor Jim Fox from the ANU, the long serving Chair of the committee and a Harvard alum, has indicated that he will be stepping down from the role of Chair. Thank you Jim for your committed leadership of this important initiative.

The Menzies scholarship was the very first initiative of the Harvard Club of Australia and, according to Club Co-Founder Jim Wolfensohn, it provided the impetus for the foundation of the club. Its continued success is a tribute to the generosity and energy of Harvard alumni.

Non-Profit Fellowship

Thanks to the generosity Bill and Lea Ferris and the energy and capability of Ted Blamey, the club celebrated the 10th Year of the Non-profit Fellowship Program.

The Club was able to award three Non-profit Fellowships in 2010. Two of the Fellowships were once again funded through the generosity of Bill & Lea Ferris, with the third made possible due to the support of the HBS Hansjoerg Wyss Fund for Social Enterprise, the YWCA NSW and the Harvard Club of Australia Foundation.

The 2010 Fellowships were awarded to Gregory Smith, CEO Asthma Foundation NSW; Adrian Collette, Chief Executive Opera Australia and Kate Frost, CEO YWCA NSW. All three fellows will attend Strategic Perspectives in Non-profit Management (SPNM) the annual strategy course for senior non-profit executives held at HBS.

The Fellowships were awarded at the annual Non-profit Luncheon by Her Excellency Professor Marie Bashir AC, Governor of NSW. We were delighted to have as our guest speaker for the lunch, club member Bill Ferris AC, who has funded 20 fellows to attend the SPNM course over the past ten years.

Chairman of the 2010 HCA NPF Committee, Mr. Ted Blamey, was assisted in the selection process by Tony Massaro, Pip Murphy, Lisa George and Melinda Conrad.

Leadership Programs

The 2010 Leadership Program, titled "Strategy for Changing Times" will be held on August 8-13th, once again overlooking beautiful Manly Beach. This year's program will be conducted by HBS Professors David Yoffie and Felix Oberholzer Gee.

The HCA Non-Profit Workshop will again be held following the leadership program. The two HBS professors will be joined in presenting the workshop by HCA-Victoria President Michael Vitale. The Non-profit Workshop has become an important development activity for many Australian non-profits who aim to send members of their executive team each year.

The success of the Leadership Programs is due in large part to the able management of Clive Gard and the team at Anderson Knight with the assistance of Ted Blamey in the design and development of the Non-Profit Workshop.

Monday Club

The Harvard Monday Club provides an opportunity for members to listen to the views of prominent Australian thinkers and achievers at informal Club luncheons. From September to November 2009, we listened to the Director of the Australian Museum, Frank Howarth, an environmentalist Robert Purves AM, and a senior Australian diplomat, Dick Woolcott AC, who talked about his role in promoting Kevin Rudd's Asia-Pacific community around the region. In 2010, we have heard Dr Alison Broinowski give a rather more critical view on the Rudd initiative, John Sinodinos AO talk about his years as Principal Private Secretary to John Howard and the current political situation, Professor Gillian Triggs, Dean of the Law School at Sydney University talk about nuclear issues, Steve Killelea discuss his global peace initiative, and the well-known Sydney journalist Hamish McDonald outline his latest book on Japan and its relevance to the present situation in that country.

Thank you to Councillor Richard Broinowski for continuing to manage this consistently stimulating and well received club event.


Anderson Knight continued to provide a wide range of services to the Club. It is a pleasure to work with them.

AUSTRALIA-HARVARD FELLOWS 2009

Professor Andrew P McMahon, PhD, Dept of Stem Cell & Regenerative Biology (FAS), FRS and US equivalents, expert in genetic approaches to human developmental programs, planned intense visits to four major research & education centres (Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane and Adelaide) to give a series of lectures about Harvard research in developmental & regenerative biology in basic and biomedical research. He intended to engage Australian scientists to discuss potential collaborative programs with HSCI / DSCRE and forge research ties with our institutions and universities and address a range of key meetings. Principal collaborators Dr Patricia Tam CMRI Westmead and Profs Peter Koopman & Melissa Little at Univ of Qld.

Professor Harald Jueppner, M.D., Professor of Paediatrics, HMS, Head of Renal & Endocrine lab Unit, Mass General Hosp. He continued existing collaborative research on renal diseases caused by different underlying genetic diseases in a number of NSW families with known but undiagnosed genetic disorders, potentially to allow the discovery of new genes with relevance not only to these families but also in our understanding of biology and disease. With Dr Steven Alexander, MPH, Head of Kidney Research, Westmead Children's Hosp.

Eric Mazur, PhD, Balkanski Professor of Physics and Applied Physics, School of Engineering & Applied Sciences, honoured for innovative physics education. His Peer Instruction program is described as "truly revolutionary". Two visits were planned, including hands-on workshops, review of faculties, a public lecture, discussing assessment practices and setting up a joint research program with the local Physics Ed Research Group, and interact with faculty programs in optics and ultra-fast lasers. A later visit was to review progress in implementing Peer Instruction (Melb.) and a hands-on workshop for faculties from Vic, SA and Tas,

Assist Prof Robert D Moir, PhD, Instructor, Dept of Neurology, HMS. Moir, an Australian, planned to work on pathological mechanisms mediating neuro-degeneration in Alzheimer's Disease, with Dr Ashley Bush, Professor of Pathology, UMelb. pioneering researcher in Alzheimer's under a Federation Fellowship at MHRI with Prof Colin Masters. His objective was to develop synergies between MHRI and HMS, make a big push on difficult collaborative projects in drug development for Alzheimer's and fertilise additional research by knowledge-exchange. Also establish exchange of students between HU and UMelb.

Assist Prof Steven W Lockley, PhD, Div of Sleep Medicine, HMS, Assoc Neuroscientist, Div of Sleep Med, Brigham & Women's Hosp. and Hon Assoc Prof. Sch of Psych, Psych and Psych Med at Monash Uni. Teach courses in Bach. of Behavioural Neuroscience and BSc. involving Drugs, Brain and Altered Awareness and "Integrative Neuroscience". Contribute to Monash projects: characterising sleep and circadian rhythm disruption in the blind, sensitivity of the human circadian pacemaker, effects of extended work hours on sleep, alertness & performance of medical interns incl. work with Prof Ron Grunstein (USyd) and Australasian Sleep Trials Network. Collab: Shantha Rajaratnam PhD, Sen Lect, Monash Uni. and co-investigator assessing relationship between Circadian amplitude and neuroticism with Dr Greg Murray of Swinburne Inst of Techn.

Kavi Bhalla, PhD, Research Scientist, HSPH, Harvard Initiative for Global Health, Cambridge, Mass. (International initiative to develop a knowledge mgt framework for road traffic injury metrics in developing countries). To collaborate with Prof James Harrison, School of Medicine, Flinders Uni. who directs the Research Centre for Injury Studies (RCIS) which operates the National Injury Surveillance Unit of the Aust. Inst of Health & Welfare. Visits intended to result in academic publication to reclassify deaths in registration data, and to identify the best method for attributing them to a known cause or condition. Also application of Global Burden of Disease (GBD) methods developed for handling multi-trauma to real world data from developing countries.
